Dear Senators:

The opioid epidemic has claimed the lives of 64,000 Americans in 2016 alone, and continues to spread like a cancer throughout our nation. First responders are on the front lines of this crisis every day, risking becoming overdosed themselves or suffering lesser, but no less serious impairment. Making matters worse, those who are exposed to opioids, such as fentanyl, are at risk of becoming addicted themselves.

It is for these reasons that the American Industrial Hygiene Association® (AIHA) strongly supports the language in Section 4 of the CARA 2.0 Act of 2018 (S.2456) concerning training and resources for first responders to help protect them from exposure to fentanyl and other illicit drugs, and how to respond if exposure does occur.

As you continue crafting funding and authorizing bills, AIHA urges you to build upon this language to help ensure that opioid exposure protection training and related resources are provided to the many other workers who are at risk of exposure. Sadly, no workplace is exempt from this scourge; as such, we must work together to protect first responders and all workers. It is only through our collective, comprehensive efforts that this epidemic will be eliminated.
